#### This Month in Civil War History: February

<u>1861</u>: The southern states that had seceded assemble delegates at Montgomery, Alabama to organize the Confederate States of America. The delegates are tasked with drafting a Confederate Constitution and establishing a provisional government.

<u>1862</u>: Battle of Roanoke Island, North Carolina. A Confederate defeat, the battle resulted in US occupation of eastern North Carolina and control of Pamlico Sound, to be used as Northern base for further operations against the southern coast.

<u>1863</u>: The most significant American Civil War event in February 1863 was the Battle of Dover (also known as the Second Battle of Fort Donelson), which took place on February 3rd in Stewart County, Tennessee

<u>1864</u>: In Georgia, Camp Sumter Prison Camp opens. Universally referred to as Andersonville Prison Camp, it will become notorious for overcrowded conditions and a high death rate among its inmates

<u>**1865**</u>: Sherman's Army captures Columbia, South Carolina while Confederate defenders evacuate Charleston, South Carolina

# <u>Person of the Month: George A. Trenholm - Profiting from the Confederacy</u>

#### **Early Life**

- Born Feb. 25, 1807, Charleston, South Carolina
- At 16, George Trenholm had begun working for a major cotton broker,
  John Fraser and Company in Charleston; Rises to partner
- By 1853 he led the company, Fraser and Trenholm & Co.
- By 1860, one of the wealthiest men in the south
- Financial investments included steamships, hotels, wharves, cotton and plantations
- Was director of the Bank of Charleston and a South Carolina railroad
- Democrat in South Carolina legislature
- In 1860, strong supporter of secession Civil War
- Civil War

#### 1861

- Liverpool based in England
- Served as financial agents for the Confederate government
- Owned more than 25 blockade runners during the war
- Estimated that by March 1863 had made \$9 million (equivalent to \$90 million in 2023) by blockade running

## **Blockade Running**

- Union blockade designed to disrupt Confederacy's foreign trade
- Larger ships loaded with military items, luxury items, etc. from England would steam across the Atlantic to the neutral ports of Nassau, Bahamas; Havana, Cuba; and St. George, Bermuda
- In port, the cargoes transferred to smaller blockade runners; returned with bales of cotton and other goods such as tobacco and turpentine

#### **Profits**

- The lifespan of a blockade runner was measured in successful trips, and four was the average number before capture
- Steamers reached profitability after just two trips, four trips/good profit
- Two round trips per month could incur \$80,000 in expenses and generate \$250,000 in revenue. Cotton valued at \$15,000 in Georgia could sell for \$150,000 in England
- Investors lined up to sink money into blockade-running companies that sprang up and shipping firms that branched out into blockade running
- The business would prove to be highly successful, not just for Southern enterprises, but for English ones as well

#### George A. Trenholm - Civil War

- Appointed to South Carolina's State Marine Battery Commission, where he oversaw the construction of the Confederate ironclad Chicora
- Trenholm personally financed construction of a twelve-vessel flotilla for Charleston's defense
- Unofficial adviser to Confederate Treasury Secretary Christopher Memminger for four years
- Succeeded Memminger in July 1864
- Could do little to stop the financial havoc as the rebel government grew insolvent and printing money caused inflation
- Continued lavish entertaining for the elite of Richmond
- Fled Richmond with the cabinet April 5, 1865
- Resigned as Treasury Secretary April 27, 1865

## **Arrest and Pardon**

- Arrested June 13, 1865, accused of stealing millions in Confederate assets
- Paroled on June 25 but arrested again on July 12
- Secretary of War Edwin Stanton suspected him of involvement in President Lincoln's assassination
- Pardoned by President Andrew Johnson/released on October 11, 1865

#### **Return to Business and Politics**

- Some properties confiscated by the U.S. government based on the failure of the Trenholm firm to pay customs duties on the many items imported by blockade runners during the war
- Trenholm's cotton brokerage firm bankrupt in 1867, but it successfully shifted to take advantage of the state's postwar phosphate mining boom
- Became known for philanthropy to blacks and whites in the South Carolina Low County
- Wrote In 1865 emancipation of blacks necessary/argued for their uplift
- Voters elected Trenholm to the South Carolina legislature in 1874, and he died in office
- Popular legend suggests that Trenholm and his exploits inspired Margaret Mitchell's character of Rhett Butler in Gone with the Wind
